Those of you who attended our Mid-Season BBQ know that it was a fun night with perfect weather and lots of tennis, food and music. We had 89 people sign up and 89 people showed up, likely making this the first Club event ever without no-shows! This is great news because no-shows have been an issue in the past and the Board has focused on it this year. Our tennis events are usually space-limited and require specific numbers to work so when someone registers and then doesn't show up, the event suffers. Furthermore, most of our events have a waiting list, so no-shows take spots away from other members. Obviously, there are times when "life intervenes" and it's not possible to attend an event as planned. In those cases, all we ask is that you notify the organizer so we can offer your spot to someone else in a timely fashion.

In the case of BBQs or other social events, no-shows cause us to incur unnecessary expense since we pay our vendors based on anticipated head count. For our opening BBQ this season, no-shows cost the Club \$800 and this is why we've started charging those who do not cancel in advance. LPTA, unlike many other clubs, offers events without charge to members. Keeping our head counts accurate helps us control costs so that we can keep doing so going forward.

Please mark your calendars for our Annual Meeting on Sunday, November 6, at 5pm. Though I hope the City's Covid numbers improve by then, we've decided again to have the meeting via Zoom as we have for the past two years. I hope to see you there.

# **Cryptogram by Ben Bass**

I have been writing puzzles for the *New York Times* since April 2020, when the newsprint puzzle page expanded due to the coronavirus pandemic. Puzzle editor Will Shortz, an old friend who was already familiar with my comedy and puzzle writing, generously thought of me for the opportunity.

He emailed to ask if I wanted the gig. I certainly did, and I joined the newspaper as one of three new puzzle writers. Now I submit jokes and trivia items every week, Will chooses the ones he likes, and we scramble them into puzzles called cryptograms. My puzzles appear in the Arts section next to the crossword every Tuesday and Thursday (but not online).

A cryptogram is a simple substitution cipher where every letter stands in for another letter. So, every Q in the puzzle might really be an A, every K a B, etc. The solver's job is to decode it, generally starting with the shorter words (e. g. a one-letter word is probably A or I) and using punctuation, letter frequency, word endings and letter patterns.

A few of my tennis-themed submissions have gotten into the paper. Here is one example for *The Racket*, which we are publishing with the express written consent of former Crawfordsville, Indiana high school tennis player Will Shortz. This puzzle ran in the *New York Times* on January 28, 2021.

I know not everyone at LPTA is into puzzles, and cryptograms can look a bit intimidating, but try using the techniques I mentioned above. Plus, you already have a big hint — you know this puzzle has to do with tennis.

Start there and see if you can solve it!
